### The Stein-Finerman Lecture

Dr. Irvin Stein, who completed a portion of his Orthopaedic Residency training at Johns Hopkins (1932-34), wished to endow a lectureship at Johns Hopkins for Orthopaedic Surgery. He had very fond memories of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at Johns Hopkins, because of both his affiliation and that of his former son-in-law, Dr. Gerald Finerman. Dr. Finerman was a resident in the Johns Hopkins Orthopaedic Surgery program from 1966-69.

At the time of Dr. Stein's death, at age 93, his daughters donated funds from his estate to endow a lectureship in his name.

Dr. Stein practiced in Philadelphia and was Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery at the University of Pennsylvania.


He endowed a lectureship there, as well. He was very interested in metabolic bone disease especially osteoporosis and Paget's disease, and co-authored a book entitled **Living Bone**; a review of clinical aspects of metabolic bone disease.

Dr. Gerald Finerman's career has spanned nearly 50 years. He is currently Head Team Physician, UCLA Athletics; Director, UCLA Sports Medicine Program; Professor of UCLA Orthopaedic Surgery. During his surgical training, he worked with injured players from the Baltimore Colts and was exposed to the new orthopaedic subspeciality of joint replacement. He went on to study in England with Sir John Charnley, a pioneer of modern total hip arthroplasty.

He went to UCLA as an assistant professor in 1971 after receiving his board certification in orthopaedic surgery, and he served from 1997-2009 as chair of the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery. In addition to his academic career, during the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, he was chief medical officer for the Olympic Village at UCLA.

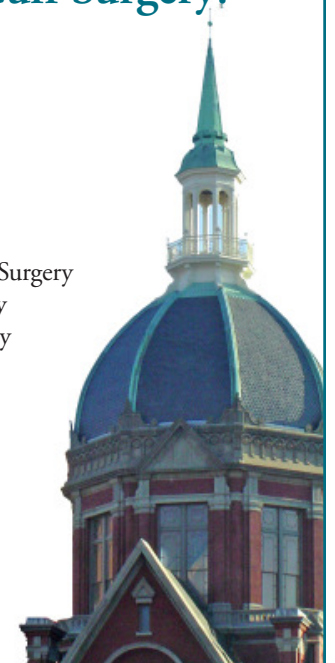

## Andrew Green, M.D.

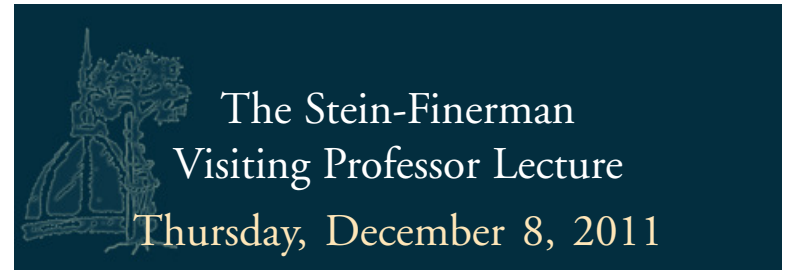
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Dr. Andrew Green, is a fellowship trained specialist in problems of the shoulder, elbow and upper extremity. Dr. Green is the chief of the division of shoulder and elbow surgery at Rhode Island Hospital and in the Department of Orthopaedic Surgery at Brown Medical School. Each year he evaluates more than one thousand new patients and performs over 400 arthroscopic, reconstructive, joint replacement, and trauma surgeries for these problems. Most commonly, he treats patients for rotator cuff disorders (impingement and tears), shoulder dislocations and instability, labral tears, arthritis, fractures and sports injuries.

As an Associate Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery and Chief of Shoulder and Elbow Surgery at Brown Medical School, he is actively involved in research and the education of future orthopaedic surgeons. He is the author of numerous articles and book chapters regarding the shoulder and elbow, and frequently presents and teaches at national and international meetings. He serves on a number of national orthopaedic committees. He is also Deputy Editor of the Shoulder and Elbow Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery.

Dr. Green is an attending surgeon at Rhode Island Hospital and The Miriam Hospital in Providence, Rhode Island, and a consultant at the Providence V.A. Medical Center.

Dr. Green is Board Certified in orthopaedic surgery in addition to being a member in both the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons, the American Shoulder and Elbow Surgeons, the Orthopaedic Trauma Association. He is an internationally recognized expert in shoulder and elbow surgery.
